

THE PRINCIPAL


As we wing our way towards the end of term one, I would like to take this opportunity to send out some well-deserved congratulations and share some information to improve communication channels in our school community.

Reporting to Parents/Caregivers



For the first time, Denmark SHS has sought and gained permission to close early for the two formal reporting to parents/caregivers days.

These will be held in Week 2 of Term 2 – on **Thursday 29 April** and in Week 1 of Term 3 – on **Wednesday 21 July**. The school's timetable will be suspended at the end of period four on these days with reporting commencing at 1.30pm and extending to 6pm. The buses will run as normal so bus students will be supervised in the school (unless parents/caregivers sign a leave form for them to go into town). Of course, if you attend prior to the end of the school day, you can collect your child in person.

Appointments will be made **via Compass** using the 'Conferences' feature on your Compass account. A how-to-guide will be sent home with your child's progress report.

Please ensure you have activated your log in and can access your Compass Parent Portal within the next two weeks to ensure you are ready to schedule your Parent-Student-Teacher conferences and don't miss out on your chosen timeslots.

We strongly advocate for your child to attend these meetings with you as education is very much a three way partnership – teacher – student – parent – with the student in the centre.

While teachers may tick the box to suggest that a parent meeting is desired, every family is welcome.

We will also be offering Compass training sessions on the day – stay tuned for more information closer to the dates.

P&C Meetings

At our first P&C of 2021 it was agreed to move the meeting night to a Monday in the hope that this will result in more people attending. It is a great opportunity to find out what is going on in the school and to have a voice with regards to how the P&C funds are allocated to support your children.



The next meeting is set down for Week 8 – **Monday 22 March – at 5.30pm in the staffroom.** Please bring a friend! Tea and coffee supplied.

Communication is Key



Compass provides an avenue for you to communicate directly with your child's teachers. You also have access to the Year Coordinators in Clea Candy (Year 7-9) and Ken (Grizz) Davies (Years 10-12).

I ask that you be mindful that most staff spend most of their days with your children and the capacity to respond swiftly to queries is limited. Teachers will do their best to respond to **emails within three working days.** If this timeframe does not meet your immediate needs, I urge you to telephone the office instead.

Contributions and Charges

While the old saying that there's no such thing as a free lunch may be true, we are very fortunate to live in a country where your child's education is largely provided through government funding. The Student Centred Funding Model goes a long way – covering the income of all employees on site, the buildings, and infrastructure such as computers, furniture and fittings.

Voluntary Contributions paid by families helps to ensure that your child has access to up to date texts and photocopying, quality consumable materials such as art and wood supplies, science chemicals for hands on experiments and food for Home Economics classes. In senior schooling, these become even more crucial and are considered **compulsory charges.**

This is especially true when payment to a registered training organisation can sometimes be a requirement upon enrolment in a certificate course. The book hire system also ensures that every student has fair access to the required texts.

We appreciate that times can be tough and money can be tight, however, your contribution makes a huge difference and is really appreciated. You can expect to receive your child's contributions and charges next week. Please note that payment plan options exist. I invite you to contact the school to discuss how this can be arranged.

As a parent or carer (we see you!) you have a lot on your plate. Our iOS and Android apps make parenting easier.


Communicate with your child's teacher, view schedules, and keep track of homework whether you're on-the-go, or in the comfort of your own home

NAPLAN will occur this year and will be conducted online. All Year 7 and 9 students are expected to sit the Writing, Reading, Language Conventions and Numeracy Test. Students completing Year 9 NAPLAN will have an opportunity to demonstrate they meet the literacy and numeracy requirements for WACE.

They can do this by reaching a Band 8 or higher in the areas of Numeracy, Reading and Writing. Attending NAPLAN is important and the following dates have already been committed to:

- 25th March at 9am all Year 7 and Year 9 students at DSHS are participating in an Australia-wide ONLINE practice test. The purpose of this practice is to check online access and make sure that all schools in the country can access the online platform. No actual data will be collected from students.
- Wednesday 12th May Year 7 and Year 9 Writing Test will occur online
- Thursday 13th May Year 7 and Year 9 Reading Test will occur online
- Friday 14th May Year 7 and Year 9 Conventions of Language Test will occur online
- Monday 17th May Year 7 and Year 9 Numeracy Test will occur online

Absences during this important process need to be avoided. The actual testing window is very tight and there are limited opportunities to catch up students who have missed their scheduled test. If any families have any concerns about their child's ability to be present during the testing window, please contact Deputy Principal Rebecca Kirkwood as a matter of urgency.


A Night at the Museum

CELLS, CELLS!-They're made of organelles!

Mr Bergmanns Year 8 class has been studying microbiology and this week took some excellent footage of single-celled paramecium.

Year 10 Science students have commenced the year studying "Earth & Space Science". As part of their course, they have been learning about the different spectral classes of stars, and also how different colour stars emit different amounts of energy and radiation. Last week, the students completed an investigation to examine the relationship between light, colour and measured heat.

The class tested four different kinds of light source, and the groups that used heat lamps achieved experimental results that gave a good approximation of the predicted colours and energy yields of stars.



After they complete the Earth & Space Science in Week 6, these students will move into their first rounds of specialised studies in physics, biology or chemistry.

Bullying - support for your child at home

If your child is being bullied, you should always take action.

Give your child as much support and love as you can at home, while you, the teacher and your child come up with a plan for fixing the bullying. Let your child know that the situation is not their fault, and it can be fixed.

Talk to your child about some of the different ways of dealing with bullying behaviour and why these work. This will help your child feel more confident and less powerless about being bullied.

Some ideas:

- Ignore it and move away from the bully. Encourage your child to physically remove themselves from children who are teasing or bullying.
- Tell the bully to stop. Standing up to bullies in a calm way lets them know that what they are trying to do is not working.
- Avoid high-risk places. By keeping away from situations where bullying occurs, your child can avoid the attention of bullies – as long as they are not missing out on activities because of this.
- Stay around other people. It can help to have others around to protect your child if they are feeling threatened.
- Ask other people for support. Others probably understand what your child is going through and are likely to help if needed. Bullies are less likely to strike if they can see that your child has backup.
- Tell the teacher. Your teacher will be able to help your child deal with the problem, and come up with a plan. The bully might not even know that the teacher is helping your child.

Denmark Senior High School is proud to continue The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award to our students in 2021.

The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award, is the world's leading youth-development program for young people. It is voluntary, non-competitive and available to anyone aged 13-24. The Award is about individual challenge, rather than reaching specific standards set by others. Young people design their own Award program, set their own goals, and record their own progress.



They choose a Service, Physical Recreation and Skills activity, go on an Adventurous Journey and, to achieve a Gold Award (the highest level), take part in a Residential Project.

There are three progressive levels which, when successfully completed, lead to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Award. The only person they compete against is themselves, by challenging their own beliefs about what they can achieve.

Over eight million young people have participated in the Award since it began in 1956 and many millions more have felt its impact in their communities.

The program is a School Curriculum and Standards Authority endorsed program and Awardees are also recognised in selection to Australian Universities.


