## Physics Visit From UWA Scientists



On Tuesday, 17<sup>th</sup> August, a group of Physicists from UWA visited our school to present an engaging speech about dark matter, experimentation and the future of quantum mechanics. The presentation covered how dark matter was discovered, by discussing the rotation of galaxies and explained, what the properties of dark matter would be. They then showed us the experimental model that the group have been creating to detect single photons of light. The group also provided physical demonstrations of quantum phenomena for us, like a model of an atomic clock.

It was a pleasure spending time learning about and discussing the cutting edge of scientific discovery in Australia, and we all appreciated their time and enthusiasm shown in presenting their talks.




## Sunsmart WA School Surfing Titles

The representative teams are on a tour of the South West and had played in a tournament in Bunbury on Tuesday. Unfortunately, their Wednesday games were cancelled so they called us for a hit out knowing we could provide them some quality opposition. We were able to hastily arrange a boys and girls team to play at short notice and the games were set to take place from 4:00pm at the Denmark Rec Centre.



The U18 SSWA boys' team is coached by my old assistant coach and Wildcats legend Mike Ellis. Due to low numbers, we recruited the help of local legends Dylan 'Ice-Man' Judd and 'awesome' Ben Eliot. Our boys were also

privileged to play alongside the director of the Woodvale Basketball Extension Program and 16-year SBL veteran, Seb Salinas, who is an assistant coach for the U18 boys.

I saw some of our boys faces drop when they walked into the Rec Centre and saw our opposition warming up. Most of the state boys were over 6'4, with their shortest being around 6'1 and a few pushing 6'8-6'9! A few have been touted as future professionals, so we would have our work cut out for us.

As the game got underway it was immediately evident that each player on the other team was an elite perimeter shooter, regardless of height or position, as they drained their first 6 or 7 shots from long range. After a short time, we started to find some rhythm, with Todd Brown proving a very difficult proposition to guard when attacking the basket. We competed admirably, as I knew we would, and gave them the hit-out they needed but eventually went down by a substantial margin. Mike Ellis was impressed with the skill and tenacity of a number of our young guys.

It was an extra special treat for our girls to be joined on court by Stacey Barr, who has played for the Perth Lynx in the WNBL and in Europe, is a former MVP of the state League in Perth and plays AFLW for the Fremantle Dockers. Her decision-making, athleticism, creativity and the effortlessness she displays when playing was a real inspiration and spark for our girls and I know they were buzzing off the experience of playing with her. Just like the boys, our girls battled hard and pushed the state girls all the way but we just couldn't reduce a ten point buffer. I know the State girls had a good time and really appreciated having a run against some quality players.



Overall, it was a magic experience and some great connections were made for some future tours and playing opportunities. I'd like to give a huge shout out to the Denmark Netball Association for allowing us to use the second court while a junior netball final was taking place. A massive thank you also to John Overton of the Denmark Rec Centre for helping make this last minute scrimmage happen and to Lindsay Stirling and Jayde McHenry for umpiring the boys' fixture.



# PASSPORT TO PARTICIPATION

As a whole school community we are raising funds for Ronald McDonald House and the organisation Canteen. Ronald McDonald House provides accommodation and vital programs for families with seriously ill children. In WA RMH has a 47 bedroom facility in Nedlands and a 14 Bedroom house attached to Perth's Children's Hospital.

In 2014, DSHS had a student who required an extensive 7 month stay in Perth and the Family utilised RMH. In speaking with a family representative recently, they acknowledged the support RMH provided but also spoke passionately about the support for the entire family (patient, parents and siblings) that the CANTEEN organisation supplied. As such we wish to fundraise for both charities.

We are requesting all current DSHS students get involved and complete 7 simple tasks / challenges at school during recess and lunch breaks. The 2021 DSHS student council have designed the task / challenges around the Act, Belong, Commit principles to encourage participation. The student council will run the task/challenges and students collect stamps on a Passport to Participate (P2P). The 7th Task is to collect and bring in a donation of \$7.00 to the DSHS Front Office. This \$7.00 could be earned as sponsorship for completing the 7 tasks, or 7 tasks round your family home is you so desire.

- **Once 200 students have completed the P2P and the student body has raised \$1500, Gavin Palmer will shave his head and beard.**
- **Once 250 students have completed the P2P and the student body raised \$1850 a mystery student has volunteered to shave their head.**
- **Once 350 students have completed the P2P and the student body raised \$5000, Mr Darren Jacques will shave his head and beard.**

Now \$5000 is a considerable amount of money, however, an anonymous donor has generously offered to match every dollar raised by students up to \$3000.

We have also secured some corporate level sponsorship from businesses and agencies that work with and support us here at DSHS.

Once students have completed their own P2P, students will work collaboratively to achieve targets set by our corporate level sponsors. A list of corporate sponsor that wish to be acknowledged will be available in our newsletters and Facebook page.

A culmination Fundraising event will coincide with Canteens National Bandanna Day event – (though the date may change due to our examination timeframes).
